Centenary Baton coming to Middlesex Tuesday 12th May - Monday 18th May 2015

Starting the journey in December 2013 NFWI Board of Trustees took the Baton to Anglesey and on New Year Day 2014 it started a 2500 mile journey from Federation to Federation. Sixty nine Federation WIs have had such fun planning its travel through each Federation, meeting the challenges of snow, hail, rain, mist, fog and sun it crossed rivers, mountains, travelled down zip wires and glided from one Federation to the next and it's not over yet as the journey will not end until June 4 at the Annual General Meeting at the Royal Albert Hall. This is your chance to get involved.

On Tuesday 12th May at 14:00 the Centenary Baton will be handed over from Hertfordshire Federation to Middlesex Federation during an afternoon tea being held at Hadley Court Golf Club. Liz Morrell, Lorraine Reed and Brenda Granshaw will accept the Baton on behalf of Middlesex. The Baton will then be taken to HA: WI meeting in the Pinner Arms. The speaker is Jane Robinson, author of the book about the WI "A Force to be reckoned with".

Wednesday 13th May – A walk is being planned around Alexandra Palace (open to all) and, the Baton will also be at Finchley WI Annual meeting in the evening Thursday 14th May - Baton will be at Hayes and Uxbridge Group meeting, being held at Hayes Community Centre from 14:00 - 16:00 Ticket available from West

Friday 15th May - Coffee morning at County office with the Board of Trustees and the Membership Committee from 10:30 – 12:30. In the afternoon Sunbury on Thames and Halliford WI are hosting an afternoon tea at the Orangery, Squires Garden Centre, Upper Halliford from 14:00 – 16:00.

Saturday 16th May – Come and join us at Westminster Bridge 11am for a walk to include Middlesex Guildhall, Downing Street, Horse Guards Parade, Trafalgar Square, Pall Mall and Buckingham Palace and St James's Park.

Monday 18th May - N1 WI members are walking the Thames path and will be at Staines Bridge 9am and walk the tow path to Walton Bridge to include Laleham and Shepperton members are welcome to walk alongside Louise and Anna to Walton Bridge (or part of the way).

The handover from Middlesex Federation to Surrey Federation will take place on a River Cruise from Walton Bridge to Teddington Lock on a Mississippi steamer style boat. Every WI in Middlesex will have already received the invitation for one of their members to attend. For those not lucky enough to receive a ticket you can cheer to boat along from the Middlesex side of the Thames from Walton Bridge to Molesey lock.

Early in March my husband Bill and I went to Denman. He to do the Decorative Paper Cutting course and me to participate in 'The Home Deli' adventure.

Home Deli: There were seven of us, the youngest being I think about 30, and a member of 90!! We started with demonstrations of all the dishes and afterwards, we 'had a go ourselves. All the ingredients arrive at your 'station' on a white tray, all weighed etc., in all we made: Toulouse Sausages, Spam, Corned Beef, Cream Cheese, Cooked Chorizo Sausage and a Terrine of Chicken Pork and Sun Dried Tomatoes. We were all totally exhausted after all this, and it included the 'youngsters' as well, which made us 'older' cooks feel a bit better!! It was absolutely superb tutoring by husband and wife team Paul & Diane Peacock. We learned about starters and rennet in cheese and why the curd in cheese separates from the whey, and how delicious are the Toulouse Sausages are in a cassoulet (Casserole - in English) I cooked them for dinner on Saturday night.

Decorative Paper Cutting: Bill's course was just as rewarding, decorative paper cutting creating patterns of leaves, and cats and birds that look just like lace fabrics. He was full of admiration of the efforts made by the WI ladies, none of whom had any previous experience but produced fantastic things to be proud of. The tutor Christine Green, was superlative with her help and guidance to everyone. We chose these courses because they meant we could both go at

the same time, albeit different 'ways', meeting up at mealtimes and evenings. The food, as usual at Denman is excellent, and the rooms are spotless and very comfortable. We were in a twin bedded room which had a walk in shower etc, suitable for disabled people, very convenient. Do go, these courses at Denman are good value for money and totally enjoyable.

We saw the studio/theatre where various radio shows are broadcast and learnt that people can apply for free tickets to many of the shows. Finally we had five volunteers who took part in a play with all the sounds that could be expected in a very creepy house. LALEHAM EVENING WI by Judith McFarlane March 2015

Our first meet up this year was for lunch at the Toby Meson which we always enjoy. Since then we have had two very interesting speakers, the first of whom was Jacqui Dimmer, a lively and entertaining speaker who told us of her experiences on her pilgrimage to Egypt and Jordan.

Her first impression of Cairo was of crowds, traffic and noise. The smell was from petrol fumes and lotus blossom. This was the time of the Spring Uprising and, as the rest of the group had backed out, Jacqui found herself the only person with the guide. She was thrilled to be shown St Sergius church which is built over the spot where the Holy Family hid when fleeing from Bethlehem. In Cairo she also visited the Museum of Egyptian Antiquities where she saw the mask of Tutankhamen made from solid gold. Jacqui then went on to Jordan where she climbed Mt Nebo which is where Moses viewed the Promised Land and is thought to be buried here. Jacqui then visited Petra, an ancient desert town, mentioned several times in the Bible. It is known for its architecture cut from the pink sandstone and its cleverly controlled water system that has enabled the area to prosper as Petra has flash floods. It is entered through a dark, narrow gorge opposite a well preserved and beautifully carved large building called the Treasury. Built in the classic style with exquisite carvings, columns and porticos, it is most dramatic with a stately feel and was built for tombs of wealthy families. There are also small dwellings in the area carved from the sandstone. Petra is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and definitely one for your bucket list!

'Chile, Land of Extremes' was the title of a talk given by Tony Lippard who also showed some really beautiful slides of this country. Chile is a narrow strip of land about 2,000 miles long on the west coast of South America. Since the end of the military regime in 1980 it has grown and prospered. There is now mineral mining and people are more relaxed with their freer life and students have been rebelling against university fees! The country is prone to volcanoes and earthquakes. The Atacama Desert is the driest place on the planet with many volcanoes and salt flats as the desert used to be under the sea. The salt has been blown by wind into different shapes and with the volcanoes this is spectacular scenery creating a moonlike surface, a photographer's dream. It has even been used to practise real moon landings! Some wildlife still manages to live here such as rabbits, flamingos, sea gulls and small wading birds. Volcanoes force up water supplying just enough moisture to support these creatures. Punta Arenas is the capital city of south Chile and has a varied history with sheep farming and a gold rush. Its position made it strategically important for steamships stopping for coal as they passed from the Atlantic the Pacific oceans and is popular today for tourists and cruises. Altogether a most fascinating and varied country to visit.

NORTHWEST LONDON WI by Pat West

Behind the Scenes at Wolf Hall. We were thrilled to welcome Bafta award winning cinematographer, Gavin Finney to our February meeting of the Northwest London WI at the Queen's Park Alice House. Gavin has worked as the director of photography on numerous feature films and television projects and he spoke about his job in general and about his work on the recent television adaptation of Hilary Mantel's Wolf Hall for BBC2. We learned about how it is the director of photography's responsibility to interpret the director's aesthetic vision and Gavin explained how on Wolf Hall, the director Peter Kosminsky looked to paintings from the time of Henry VIII for inspiration. He wanted to bring the art of Hans Holbein and his contemporaries to life and did this by filming exclusively on location and by authentically recreating the costumes and lighting of the Tudor period. To help recreate period paintings, the director insisted that candles only were used for lighting interior scenes at night and Gavin talked about the challenges of working in historic houses, some still private homes in the same family ownership as in the time of Henry VIII. He spoke about working in the dark, about the risks of open flame and about the added challenges the actors faced wearing bulky period costumes. Gavin also explained about the various roles of his crew and about the process of making a film. We saw many behind the scenes photos of Gavin working and he explained about the various equipment he used to achieve specific shots. He also showed us a selection of clips from Wolf Hall and explained the director's objectives and about how these objectives were technically realised. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed Gavin's talk, and lively question and answer session following, and the insight it gave us on the making of Wolf Hall. We were fortunate to have a great speaker treat us to a talk on

NORWOOD GREEN WI by Joan Storkey

The Poppy Factory: We can highly recommend a visit to the Poppy Factory near Richmond Bridge! After WW1, Major General Howson MC, was so appalled at the plight of disabled servicemen that he decided to try and give them employment. He wrote in 1921 'I have been given a cheque for £2000 to make poppies with. It is a large responsibility and will be very difficult. If the experiment is successful, it will be the start of an industry to employ 150 men. I do not think it can be a great success, but it is worth trying. I consider the attempt ought to be made if only to give the disabled their chance'. Machines were invented that can be operated by a man using one arm only, and we saw the whole process from cutting out the shapes in paper and silk to the assembly of poppies and wreaths. Both men and women are now employed there. We each made a poppy, which we could keep, using one hand only and the other being held behind our backs. There was no charge for the hour and a half talk and tour but we all made a donation.

Jonathan Fryer kept us entertained at our March meeting where we welcomed another new member. It was also Win Coveney's 90th Birthday and we celebrated by presenting her with cards, a gift and a beautiful cake. Win treated the committee to lunch at the Plough, Norwood Green, which coincided with their fundraising event for Comic Relief. It was a cold day and the roaring log fire was most welcome.
